- The White House sent a letter to the Office of the President and the Prime Minister of Ukraine with a list of priority reforms that Ukraine must implement in order to receive military aid and weapons. The changes concern the functioning of the Supervisory Boards of state-owned enterprises, anti-corruption bodies, the High Council of Justice, and the judiciary in general. The reform of the Ministry of Defense and all law enforcement agencies is also a priority.
- The United States imposed sanctions on 11 Chinese and 5 Russian companies for supplying components for drone production. Among these companies is Asia Pacific Links Ltd. which supplied parts for the Orlan-10 Uncrewed Aerial Vehicle. Restrictions were also imposed on Russia's VSMPO-AVISMA Corporation (Russian: BCMIIO-ABI/CMA), a global titanium producer.
- The Defense Committee of the Bulgarian Parliament has approved the transfer of defective guided missiles for S-300 air defense systems to Ukraine. It is planned that Ukraine will be able to repair them and use them in air defense.
- Following a meeting between German and Estonian Ministers of Defense Boris Pistorius and Hanno Pevkur, the German Ministry of Defense announced that Estonia plans to join the German framework contract for the supply of ammunition to ensure Ukraine's resilience.
- Romanian Prime Minister Marcel Ciolacu claimed that Romania did not impose a unilateral ban on imports of Ukrainian agricultural products, including grain, like Poland or Slovakia and Hungary, because it believes that Ukraine needs to be helped until this war ends. According to Ciolacu, the dialogue helped to find a system of licensing exports from Ukraine so that farmers would be protected.
- Volodymyr Zelenskyi met with the new UK Secretary of State for Defense, Grant Shapps, who arrived in Kyiv on an official visit. Zelenskyi thanked the UK for its strong financial, defense, and humanitarian support for Ukraine and discussed the strengthening of air defense.
- Ukraine became a member of the IAEA Board of Governors for 2023-2025. The Board of Governors consists of representatives of 35 countries. The Board makes decisions that are binding on all IAEA member states.
- NATO Secretary General Jens Stoltenberg arrived in Kyiv for an unannounced visit and met with Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyi.
- Stoltenberg announced that the Alliance will continue to support Ukraine with weapons and has already signed framework contracts worth €2.4 billion for ammunition to meet the needs of Ukrainian troops. Ukraine and NATO are also working on an adapted annual program that will determine how Ukraine is meeting the Alliance's principles and standards.
 - Stoltenberg emphasized that by reducing the accession procedure to one step, agreeing on a program to ensure full interoperability of the Ukrainian armed forces with NATO forces, and establishing the NATO-Ukraine Council, Ukraine is now closer to NATO than ever before.

- Minister of the Armed Forces of the French Republic Sébastien Lecornu arrived in Kyiv. He was accompanied by about 20 representatives of defense companies. President of Ukraine Volodymyr Zelenskyi met with Lecornu and presented him with the Order of Merit, second class. Discussing the strengthening of Ukraine's defense capabilities with the support of France, Zelenskyi and Lecornu discussed the possibility of joint production of certain types of weapons.
- The EU Council has extended temporary protection for Ukrainian refugees until March 4, 2025. This protection includes the possibility of residence, access to the labor market and housing, medical and social assistance, and education for children.
- Germany's Competition Authority has allowed Rheinmetall to set up a defense company in Ukraine. Its first stage will focus on the maintenance and repair of equipment that Germany has transferred to Ukraine. Then it is planned to manufacture certain types of Rheinmetall weapons.
- The US House of Representatives voted for a separate tranche of \$300 million for Ukraine. This amount had previously been removed from the draft defense budget, so the allocation of aid was voted on separately. This tranche is not related to the additional \$24 billion in funding for Ukraine that the White House requested in August.
- British Foreign Secretary James Cleverly announced new sanctions against Russia for organizing pseudo-elections in the occupied territories of Ukraine. The new sanctions list includes 11 individuals and legal entities. In total, the United Kingdom has imposed sanctions on 1,600 individuals and legal entities in response to Russia's invasion of Ukraine.
- In Slovakia, volunteers raised €650,000 for a Bozena-5 demining machine for Ukraine. The manufacturer, The Way Industries, promises to deliver it by the end of the year. It will also send additional equipment and train sappers to work with the machine.
- Switzerland allocates \$109 million for demining in Ukraine. The funds will be provided throughout 2024-2027.
- Norway is also closing its border to vehicles with Russian number plates. The restriction will come into effect on October 2. Earlier, Finland, Poland, Latvia, Lithuania, and Estonia did the same.
- The First International Forum of Defense Industries started in Kyiv today with the participation of 252 defense companies from over 30 countries. The President of Ukraine Volodymyr Zelenskyi has already met with representatives of defense companies and associations from the United States, the UK, Germany, France, Turkey, Sweden, and the Czech Republic.
- Volodymyr Zelenskyi announced the creation of the Defense Industries Alliance, which "will work to protect international law and the nations of the world from any aggression." Defense Industries Alliance has already been joined by 38 companies from 19 countries. Within the framework of the Forum only, Ukraine has signed 20 agreements and memorandums on the manufacture of drones, and repair and production of armored vehicles and ammunition. These include joint production, technology exchange, and the supply of components.

- > Towards Chernihiv and Kharkiv, Russians hold troops covering the Ukrainian border, conduct agile diversions in order to prevent the Ukrainian army from relocating to threatening areas near the border and increase the mine and explosive barriers along the Ukrainian border in the Belgorod oblast.
- > Towards Kupiansk and Lyman, Russians did not conduct offensive (assault) actions. Towards Bakhmut, they unsuccessfully tried to regain the lost position near Klishchiivka in Luhansk oblast.
- > Towards Avdiivka, Mariinka, and Shakhtarsk, Russians conducted more than 20 unsuccessful attacks as well as tried to regain the lost position southwest of Avdiivka in Donetsk oblast.
- > Towards Zaporizhzhia, Russians unsuccessfully tried to regain the lost positions near Robotyne and Verbove.
- > The Ukrainian Army continues to conduct offensive operations towards Melitopol and assault operations towards Bakhmut, inflicting losses to Russian manpower and equipment, and exhausting the Russians along the entire front line.
- > Towards Kherson, the Ukrainian Army continues the counter-battery fight, destroys Russian support depots and inflicts successful damage on their rear.

At night, Ukrainian air defense forces destroyed 26 drones over the country. In total, Russian forces launched 38 drones.

- > The Russian army attacked the Izmail district of Odesa oblast with drones: there were hits to the port infrastructure. Two truck drivers were injured
- > A Russian drone hits an infrastructure facility in Cherkasy oblast. Preliminary, without casualties.
- In the morning, Russian troops launched a missile attack on one of the enterprises in Kryvyi Rih.

Kharkiv and Kharkiv oblast

On September 25, the Russian army shelled Vovchansk in Kharkiv oblast: private houses were damaged and two people were injured, according to the head of the Oblast Military Administration (OMA), Syniehubov. On September 29, Russia launched air strikes near Komisarove, Petropavlivka, Ivanivka, Pishchane, Kopanky, and Senkove in Kharkiv oblast. At least eight settlements in the oblast also came under mortar and artillery fire.

Donetsk oblast

- > On September 25, two people died in Donetsk oblast as a result of Russian shelling. On September 27, one person died and five were wounded as a result of Russian shelling. On September 28, the Russian occupiers struck again at Kostiantynivka, injuring three people, they suffered lacerations and fractures. This is the third shelling of Kostiantynivka in the last two days. On the same day, Russian troops hit the territory of Avdiivka Coke and Chemical Plant with two rockets. It caused a fire at the plant. The occupiers shelled Krasnohorivka and Kurdyumivka with artillery, killing three people and injuring others. On the night of September 29, the Russian army struck Kostiantynivka with an S-300 missile - no one was killed or injured, but the administrative building and warehouses of the enterprises were damaged. The Russian military launched two missile attacks on Kramatorsk on the night of September 30. One person was injured. A dormitory and 37 cars were damaged.
- > In the Volnovakha sector, Vuhledar, Novoukrainka, Prechystivka, and Shakhtarske of the Velyka Novosilka community came under fire. Damage was inflicted to houses and outbuildings.
- > In the Donetsk sector, Avdiivka, Kurakhivka and Ostrovske of the Kurakhivka community, Zoria, Kurakhove, Hostre, Novoselivka Persha and Orlivka of the Ocheretyne community, Stepanivka, Krasnohorivka, Yelizavetivka, Novomykhailivka of the Marinka community, and Veselyi Hai are under fire. Damage was done to houses, recreation centers, and a medical facility, and a fire broke out on farmland.
- > In the Horlivka sector, Toretsk community, Toretsk, Pivnichne, Petrivka, New York, Druzhba, Shcherbynivka, Illinsk community, Dyliivka of Kostiantynivka community, Kostiantynivka, Kalynivka of Chasiv Yar community and Makove come under fire. In the Soledar community, Rozdolivka, Vasiukivka and Minkivka are under attack. Among the damaged buildings are houses, industrial buildings, an infrastructure facility, a cafe, a shop, 2 school buildings, an administrative building, power lines, and a gas pipeline.
- In the Lysychansk sector, Siversk, Lyman community, Rubtsi, Novoselivka, Zarichne, Torske and Zvanivka came under fire. The shelling damaged houses, non-residential buildings, outbuildings, and a farm, and caused dead wood to catch fire. There are wounded or dead in all directions.

Kherson and Kherson oblast

On September 25, Russian aviation dropped four guided bombs on Beryslav in the morning. One of them hit the building of the housing and maintenance office. Three people were reported dead. Another bomb destroyed a residential building. On the same day, in the evening, Russian troops shelled the Dniprovsky district of Kherson. It wounded a woman. Other residential areas of Kherson were also shelled. Three people were killed: two men and a woman who were on the street. Two more wounded have been reported. On September 26, two people were wounded as a result of the morning shelling of the Korabelny district of Kherson. Multistory buildings and private houses were damaged. The Russian army fired twice at Kyselivka. Six people were injured as a result of the attack. Russian troops also attacked Beryslav with a kamikaze drone, injuring a police officer. As a result of the shelling of Kherson, a 52-year-old woman was hospitalized in moderate condition. Two wounded men were treated on the spot. On September 26, the Russian army fired 119 times at Kherson oblast. On September 27, Russian aircraft attacked near Mykolaivka, without causing casualties. A man was killed in a nighttime Russian attack on Kherson, another was wounded. On the morning of September 28, the occupiers attacked Antonivka near Kherson, wounding three people. Zolota Balka in Beryslav district was also shelled, causing no casualties. An artillery strike was made on Kherson, resulting in the killing of three women. In the morning of September 29, two employees of a utility company were wounded in Kherson. Air strikes were carried out on Burgunka and Olgivka in Kherson oblast, with 20 guided bombs fired at them. One person was wounded and 24 private houses were damaged. On September 30, an educational institution was damaged. In the Korabelny district of the city, fires broke out in a garage cooperative and at a stadium as a result of shelling.

Zaporizhzhia and Zaporizhzhia oblast

On September 25, one person was killed and another was injured in the attacks in Zaporizhzhia. On September 26, the Russian army attacked Zaporizhzhia oblast 130 times: one person was killed and another was injured. On September 30, two rocket attacks were launched against the Matviyivka community in Zaporizhzhia. Five people were injured, one of them was hospitalized. Five houses and a critical infrastructure facility were damaged.

Dnipropetrovsk oblast

On the night of September 27, Russian troops shelled the Nikopol district of Dnipro oblast with heavy artillery: two people were wounded. As a result, six houses, a private enterprise, cars, gas pipelines, and a power line were damaged.

Mykolaiv oblast

On the morning of September 29, the Russian army launched a missile attack on Mykolaiv, hitting an infrastructure facility. The fire has already been extinguished.



- As a result of enemy missile attacks last winter, about 63% of the equipment needed for the stable course of the autumn and winter period was seriously damaged. This was stated by Kyiv Mayor Vitalii Klychko. He noted that over UAH 1 billion (over USD 26 million) has been allocated from the local budget this year to repair heating system equipment.
- Naftogaz has announced that for the first time, Ukraine will get through the winter with domestically produced gas. CEO Oleksiy Chernyshov said that a record number of new wells were drilled this year. The calculations confirm the ability to go through the heating season on its own and without changing the price for the population.
- Volodymyr Kudrytskyi, the head of Ukrenergo, has already stated that Ukrenergo's substations are protected from missile attacks: it is a comprehensive defense, both active in the form of air defense and passive in the form of engineering fortifications.
- Vkrenergo also reported that 400 settlements are still deprived of electricity due to the hostilities and other reasons. Due to the hostilities, there is damage in the power grids of Donetsk, Dnipro, Odesa, Sumy, Kharkiv, and Kherson regions.
 - Russians have introduced curfews and military censorship in the occupied part of the Donetsk region. Censorship is being imposed on postal correspondence, messages in social networks and messengers, e-mail, and telephone conversations will be monitored. Most likely, they will be tapped.
 - Ukraine purchased and transported diesel fuel to the Zaporizhzhia NPP occupied by Russian troops. This was announced by Energy Minister Herman Halushchenko. In total, about 500 tons of diesel were delivered to the plant. Halushchenko said: "Ukraine and Energoatom purchased and transported diesel through Russian checkpoints. We asked to agree on a corridor to deliver the fuel there so that when there was a blackout 7 times a day, we would not have a nuclear accident."
 - The night attack on Odesa on September 25 damaged nine UNESCO-protected sites. All the buildings are architectural monuments of national importance.
 - In his report to the Human Rights Council in Geneva, the chairman of the independent International Commission of Inquiry into Violations in Ukraine, Eric Møse, said that the commission continues to find numerous pieces of evidence of war crimes committed by Russian armed forces in Ukraine, including unlawful attacks with explosive weapons, attacks that harm civilians, torture, sexual and gender-based violence, and attacks on energy infrastructure.
 - Since the beginning of the war in 2014 Russia has committed 534 crimes against Ukraine's cultural heritage sites. This data was documented by the Crimean Institute for Strategic Studies (CISS), a non-governmental organization, said project manager Elmira Ablyalimova-Chyihoz. "We started with the first case the Bakhchysarai Khan's Palace. And I remember how difficult it was to convince the monument protection community that what was happening on the territory of this palace was not restoration work. This is the destruction and mockery of the monument. And what we see today has confirmed all our sad predictions," Ablyalimova-Chyihoz said. Elmira also noted that among the 534 recorded violations committed by the Russian invaders, 200 of them were recorded in Crimea and 334 in the temporarily occupied territories of Kherson, Luhansk, Zaporizhzhia, and Donetsk regions.

- More than half of young people in Ukraine would not like to migrate to another place and want to participate in the reconstruction process. These are the findings of a **national youth survey** conducted on behalf of the International Republican Institute as part of the USAID "Dreaming and Acting" program. The survey was conducted among young people aged 10-35 who live in Ukraine and moved to Poland after February 24, 2022. 89% of young people aged 16-35 who live in Ukraine see the **future of Ukraine as encouraging**, while among young people who moved to Poland, this figure is 81%. Young people are also determined to participate in the process of rebuilding Ukraine. This desire was expressed by 79% of respondents in Ukraine and 83% in Poland.
- The NACP's anti-corruption register is again available on the Unified State Open Data Portal. This was announced by the head of the Ministry of Digital Transformation Mykhailo Fedorov. "Now everyone can check whether a person or business is involved in corruption. The registry will also help journalists and the public to expose corruption schemes," he said in a statement. The Minister reminded that during the full-scale invasion, access to many registers was closed due to security issues.
- In the village of Savintsy, Kharkiv region, police exhumed the body of a man tortured by Russians in 2022. This was reported by the press service of the Main Directorate of the National Police in Kharkiv region. "Witnesses say that the body had huge bruises, and rope marks on the hands," the police said.
- In Crimea, after a series of strikes on military facilities, "spies" supporting the Ukrainian Armed Forces are detained almost daily. This is reported by the publication "Krym.Realii". Thus, on September 29, the Russian Federal Security Service announced the detention of a resident of Kerch. The 45-year-old man was allegedly "taking photos and videos of the movement of military equipment" on behalf of the Main Intelligence Directorate of the Ministry of Defense of Ukraine and passing this information to a "curator".
- The Government has established the State Service for Children. In addition, the Service will interact with Ukraine's diplomatic missions abroad to ensure that children's rights are respected and that they are returned to Ukraine. "This Service, as a central executive body, will implement state policy in the field of child protection, social support for families with children, development of family forms of education and adoption," the statement said. It is noted that today there are more than 7.5 million children in Ukraine who suffer from the impact of Russian aggression. At the same time, more than 65 thousand children in Ukraine are orphans or deprived of parental care.
- Prime Minister Denys Shmyhal says that 37 Ukrainian defense industry enterprises have been affected by Russian shelling. Shmyhal said this at the Defense Industries Forum, Interfax-Ukraine reports. The Prime Minister said that the government is currently working on additional proposals to restore these enterprises.
